WBT is very fortunate to have such an exceptional and active core of leaders and minister lay assistants. In case you are unaware, WBT has 6 Certified Minister Lay Assistants. Kudos to Rev. Bert who continues to train and guide us through chanting, including the Shoshinge, conducts Dharma classes and meditation sessions.

In an article by our current Monshu Kojun Ohtani in his book Moving Forward Just As You Are. Monshu says, 'Human relationships are always changing, but in those relationships each of us is shining. We must understand the preciousness of our lives." In Buddhism, there is a phrase "all things are impermanent." All things without exception, without pause, will change. And within each of these moments, while all things are changing, they are also interacting with one another.

Human relationships are also not permanent and constantly changing. If each person treats his/her own life and that of other people with preciousness, then we have a wonderful relationship where each person is illuminated as they support each other in life. The Monshu further states; "There are people who turn their backs on the universal truth of this world. However, Buddhism encompasses all of space, time and humanity itself". Whether the Buddha awakened to it or not, this truth has existed and always will. What also doesn't change throughout time and space is our human nature. Thus, the universal teaching of Buddhism that Shakyamuni expresses to humanity, applies to any time period in history and the future to come, reaching any point in the vast world we live in and beyond.

Rev. Marvin Harada, Bishop of the Buddhist Churches of America, says that Jodo Shinshu teachings are universal. The Shin Buddhist Path is open to anyone; man, woman or child, LGBTQ+, people of color without regard to race or nationality. There are those who prefer our churches and temples to be "Japanese" only. So how can we share the universal qualities of Shin Buddhism? (1) Through focusing on our everyday lives, whether we are at work or school or recreation, they are all opportunities to listen and reflect on the Dharma. (2) The Shin path is to see and awaken to one's ego, which opens up the world of non-ego. (3) Compassion has no boundaries. Shin Buddhism focuses on the compassion aspect of enlightenment. Great Compassion knows no bounds in ethnicity, intelligence, or physical capability.

Rev. Harry Bridge says you can share the Dharma as three Bs:

Be Aware - listen carefully, hear the teachings in your heart, express gratitude

Be Kind -- to even those you find it hard to show kindness. Smile, show kindness even when it is hard.

Be Yourself – Take time to think, to meditate and reflect on who you are and what is important to you.

Reverend David Nakamoto Bodhi Day Service Guest Speaker


December 17, 2023

Ma`i Movement Hawaii supports women and girls who are in need of period products and are unable to afford them.

60% of Hawai`i families are struggling to make ends meet. 42% of Native Hawaiian and other Pacific islanders are in need of period products. Until recently many public schools did not have readily available period products and several girls were not attending school during their period.

The organization provides kits that include various period items to local Oahu organizations such as, but not limited to: Waimanalo Health Center, Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, Hale Kipa, Family Promise of Hawaii, Child & Family Service, Catholic Charities Hawaii, Hawaii Food Bank, Family Hui Hawaii and also provides kits to organizations on Hawai'i island, Moloka'i, Kaua'i, Ni'ihau and Lana'i.

On October 22, 2023, WBT members packaged 100 kits to donate to the Ma'i Movement Hawaii.
